Effective leadership is a cornerstone of success in any organization or endeavor. While it takes many forms, certain principles remain universal. The Mission of MASA is to "Develop and support effective public school leaders who positively impact the lives of Missouri students." Insightful thought leaders like Simon Sinek, John Baldoni, Jim Collins, John Maxwell, Liz Wiseman, and Robin Sharma have contributed significantly to our understanding of what makes a leader effective. In this edition of the MASA Spotlight, I want to highlight these leaders and their keys to effective leadership.

Vision and Inspiration

Simon Sinek, renowned for his concept of the "Golden Circle," emphasizes that effective leaders start with "why." In his book Start with Why, Sinek argues that leaders who inspire others are those who communicate a clear and compelling purpose. "People don't buy what you do; they buy why you do it," he says. This principle underscores the importance of vision in leadership. Effective leaders articulate a vision that resonates deeply with their team, providing a sense of purpose that drives collective effort and commitment.

Emotional Intelligence and Empathy

John Baldoni, a thought leader in leadership communication, highlights the significance of emotional intelligence in leadership. Baldoni suggests that effective leaders must be adept at managing their own emotions and understanding the emotions of others. This involves not only empathy

but also the ability to inspire and influence positively. As Baldoni puts it, "Leadership is an active process, and it requires engaging with people in ways that are thoughtful and considerate."

Disciplined Leadership

Jim Collins, in his seminal work Good to Great, introduces the concept of Level 5 Leadership, which combines deep personal humility with intense professional will. Collins argues that the most effective leaders are those who are fiercely committed to their organization's success yet remain humble enough to put the interests of the organization ahead of their own. "Good is the enemy of great," Collins famously notes, emphasizing that effective leaders are never complacent; they continuously strive for greatness by maintaining discipline and focus.

Influence and Integrity

John Maxwell, a prolific author on leadership, asserts that "Leadership is influence-nothing more, nothing less." For Maxwell, leadership is fundamentally about the ability to influence others. However, this influence must be rooted in integrity. Maxwell believes that trust is the foundation of leadership; without it, a leader's influence is severely diminished. Effective leaders build and maintain trust by consistently demonstrating integrity in their actions and decisions.

Multiplication of Talent

Liz Wiseman, author of Multipliers, argues that the most effective leaders are those who amplify the intelligence and capabilities of the people around them. Wiseman describes two types of leaders: "diminishers," who drain energy and creativity, and "multipliers," who inspire and elevate others. "The best leaders make everyone around them smarter," Wiseman asserts. By empowering their teams, these leaders foster innovation, collaboration, and growth.

Personal Mastery and Authenticity

Robin Sharma, in his book The Leader Who Had No Title, emphasizes the importance of personal mastery and authenticity in leadership. Sharma believes that leadership is not confined to a title or position; rather, it is about leading by example and striving for excellence in all aspects of life. He encourages leaders to cultivate selfdiscipline, courage, and a commitment to continuous personal growth. "The smallest of actions is always better than the noblest of intentions," Sharma writes, urging leaders to embody their values through consistent, authentic action.

Effective leadership is a complex and multifaceted discipline that requires a blend of vision, emotional intelligence, discipline, integrity, the ability to empower others, and personal mastery. By drawing on the insights of thought leaders like Simon Sinek, John Baldoni, Jim Collins, John Maxwell, Liz Wiseman, and Robin Sharma, each of us can continue to develop and enhance the qualities necessary to inspire and guide our teams and organizations toward lasting success.

School Leaders: Take Action!

Public school superintendents play a pivotal role in shaping the educational landscape of their districts and the state of Missouri. School leaders hold a unique understanding of the intricacies and challenges facing their districts. The unique decisions that each district and community must make are all impacted by the decisions (or lack of action) of policymakers in Jefferson City. Failing to engage with these representatives and senators, places your district, and by extension your community's needs at risk of being overlooked or misunderstood by policymakers. Ultimately, such actions may lead to adverse consequences for taxpayers, parents, students, and teachers.

Consider the following suggestions for strategies and possible actionable items that may assist you in more effectively engaging policymakers.



Take Advantage of Your Association **Membership:** Stay up-to-date on the various proposals being considered by policy makers. This can be done by staying current on the various updates that are provided from your professional organizations like our School Administrators Coalition (SAC) weekly legislative bulletin, the weekly MASA legislative video conferences, and attendance to regional meetings.

• Action Item: Place regional *meetings and statewide conferences* on your calendar now.

Build Relationships: Regular interactions, open communication, and attempts at collaboration with policymakers help create an environment where superintendents can articulate their district's needs effectively. Given that Missouri just finished the

primary election, and the November general election is just around the corner, these elections present new opportunities to meet and connect with new or existing legislators representing your district.

• Action Item: Invite your representative(s)/Senator(s) to *your district. This is especially* recommended if you have newly *elected state representative(s) or Senator(s) that will be representing* your district in January.

Understand, Develop and Utilize Your **Influence:** Engaging your community in support of district initiatives and the impact of policies on your district can be a powerful tool. Superintendents are well positioned to leverage their relationships to garner support from parents, teachers, and community members, which can subsequently persuade policymakers to prioritize the needs of your district and community as they consider policy changes.

• Action Item: Make a list of 25 of the most influential members of your community with a connection to your school district. When bills come up during the legislative session, reach out to those individuals and discuss the issues and ask them to help the district advocate for/against those items.

> Our team in Jefferson City works tirelessly are informed of the bills and policies that are being considered at the

Capitol. While we do our best to discuss the impact with lawmakers, the actual story of your district can only be told by you and others within your district. As we look at the various issues facing public schools, the involvement of school leaders, particularly their ability to either engage directly with lawmakers or to activate others within your community is a vital component of the advocacy strategies necessary to be successful in the coming months.
